KINGMAN, ARIZONA TOURISM AND RECREATION

Railroad Museum – A terrific museum filled with model trains and various dioramas; has railroad artifacts, memorabilia, and historic displays. They switch out their trains frequently, so that way you have a chance to see new trains every time you come. They are open Friday through Sunday, 10:00am to 4:00pm. With frequent changes in trains, there is something new to see every time you visit.

The Bonelli House – One of the first settler homes in Kingman, AZ. Originally rebuilt in the year 1915. Family friendly guided tours starting every 30 minutes (last tour starts at 2:30) Tuesday through Friday. The home belonged to a lovely couple named George and Effie Bonelli and their children. They rebuilt their house in just a short nine months. The house that is standing today has some of the family's possessions, like clothing, accessories, books, and more.

Wed in 1895, George and Effie Bonelli were some of Kingman's early settlers. When a disastrous fire destroyed their house on Spring Street in 1915, they used local stone to rebuild and that home stands to this day. It is now a museum containing many of its original furnishings and possessions, with family friendly guided tours starting every 30 minutes (last tour starts at 2:30) Tuesday through Friday.

The Art Hub – You can take some art classes, or you can buy the art you see in the building or on their website; they also have an arts and science class for kids ages 6-12. Every six weeks, they transition it from an art gallery to an education center and back again. They offer various different type of art classes, like the visual arts, dance, and theatre classes.

Route 66 Axe Throwing – A fun and unique experience, with axe throwing, and interactive projected targets. They will help you with any type of party you are having, from birthdays to bachelor/ bachelorette parties, work events, and other occasions. They are open Thursday and Friday from 5:00pm to 9:00pm and Saturday from 4:00pm to 9:00pm.

Giganticus Headicus – It is part of the longest uninterrupted stretch of Route 66 in Arizona. There are some other amazing art projects right next to the Headicus that is done by Gregg Arnold and there is a wonderful giftshop located directly next to the Headicus.

Axe Bros Axe Throwing – A fun experience with axe throwing. It is great for big parties. They have 12 lanes and 21 targets to use. They are open Sunday through Friday, 12:00pm to 8:00pm and Saturday, 12:00pm to 10:00pm.

Locomotive Park – Has a retired locomotive, that you can climb up into the cab and see the old steam engine. You can also see active trains going by, while you are visiting. It is great for children and adults.

Lewis Kingman Park – A beautiful park where you can take your dogs to go play. Has a picnic area, with a multi-purpose field that is great for events and fun activities.

Cecil Davis Park/Splash Pad – Has a great playground for the kids, with a basketball court. A good picnic area with a big multi-purpose grassy area for fun activities and events. A great splash pad for kids to go and cool off when it is hot out.

Centennial Park – Is a big and beautiful park. Has a great playground for the kids, and a bunch of different fields for certain activities, like a basketball court, soccer field, tennis, volleyball, and so much more. It has sheltered areas for your outdoor picnics and tables to sit at. There is a dog park to let your dogs go out and play.

Mohave Museum of History and Arts – An introduction of the history of Northwestern Arizona. Has outdoor exhibits that displays ranching, mining machinery, and a railroad caboose. It also includes an Andy Devine exhibit, who was a local boy that turned into a movie star. This is a good place for history buffs to dig into the museum's library while they are there and learn some more interesting history. They are open Tuesday through Saturday, 9:00am to 4:00pm, and last admission is at 3:30pm.

Cerbat Cliffs Golf Course – A beautiful and well-maintained municipal course that has a full 18 holes to play, a bar and grill, and a pro-shop restaurant. Cerbat Cliffs has been welcoming golfers for over 80 years and is great for both individuals and groups. Additionally, tournaments are regularly held both for charity and for fun.

Cerbat Lanes – A 24-lane bowling alley with automatic score keeping and optional bumper rails for all lanes. In addition to bowling there is an arcade, pool tables, soft tipped darts, Buzztime Trivia, a banquet party room, a full-service pro shop, a snack bar and grill, and an outdoor patio. Cerbat Lanes is open from 12:00pm to 10:00pm on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Sunday, and 12:00pm to 11:00pm on Friday and Saturday.

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Bank Street Guns Indoor Shooting Range – Locally owned and family operated business that is the largest gun shop in Mohave County, Arizona. They have a large selection of guns to choose from with the proper attachments that are needed. They have seven indoor lanes. They can help you find the perfect firearm for yourself and will also help you attain the skills necessary to operate the firearms in a safe and responsible manner. They are open Monday through Friday, 9:00am to 6:00pm and Saturday, 9:00am to 5:00pm; closed on Sundays.

Valle Vista Golf Course – A beautiful and fun course that has an amazing view of nature. Offers 18 holes to play. They have a Pro Shop, Bar and Lounge, and a Restaurant. A great place to relax a bit and spend some quality time with your friends and family.

Hualapai Mountain Park – A beautiful mountain park with plenty of hiking trails of varying difficulty, a playground, and a disc golf course. The entire park is full of large and healthy trees, and wildlife including elk, squirrels, foxes, and woodpeckers. During the day you can see the clouds racing by and at night you can see every star in the sky.

Keepers of the Wild – A nonprofit animal sanctuary located in Valentine, Arizona that takes care of a variety of animals including lions, tigers, bears, primates, birds, and local wildlife. Informative guided safari tours are offered three times daily. The park is open year-round, Wednesday through Monday, from 9:00am to 5:00pm.

Alpacas of the Southwest – Has guided tours of the ranch where you can get up close to the alpacas and learn all about them. They are kid friendly; you can pet, feed, and take pictures with the alpacas. They have a great gift shop with a bunch of unique items for you to browse around. They are open Friday to Monday, 10:15am to 3:30pm.

Cerbat Foothills Recreation Area – A beautiful area to do a hike, ride a mountain bike, or to even take up your horses and ride them. It has 37+ miles of trails with a bunch of different trail heads for you to start at and choose from so you can do the one that best suits you. Gives you an amazing view of the nature around it and is a great place to see the sunrise and sunset.

Monolith Garden Trail – A beautiful trail that you can hike, mountain bike, horseback ride on, and do trail runs on. It is about six miles long and has some amazing views of nature. On this easy-to-moderate hike, you get the chance to see some interesting volcanic rock formations along the way.

White Cliffs Wagon Trail – Tucked away above and behind our historical downtown is another bit of history, waiting to be hiked. White Cliffs Wagon Trail follows the path ore wagons took in the late 1800s from the Stockton Hill Mines to the railroad. The wagon tracks have been cut deep into the stone and there are depressions along both sides of the roadbed, which were used for stubbing posts and ropes to help get the heavy wagons up and down the grade. Work on the trail is ongoing, and will eventually link downtown with uptown, near the Cerbat Cliffs Golf Course.

Desert Diamond Distillery – A diamond in the desert indeed, Arizona's oldest craft distillery can be found off Route 66 near the Kingman Airport. Come to the tasting room and sample their award-winning rums, whiskies, and vodka, book a tour of the production and barrel rooms, or make reservations to dine in the Lost Rail Car #30. Also available, overnight stays in Caboose 999, with a soaking tub and private patio.

Cella Winery – In 2007, Carlos Cella built a winery in Valle Vista, near Kingman. He had found the soil to be perfect for grape vines; better, in fact, than in California wine country. In the coming years many others followed his lead, but Cella Winery was the first. Now owned by the Spencer family, Cella produces a variety of finely crafted red and white wines, and their tasting room is open Friday through Sunday 11:00am to 6:00pm, Thursdays 4:00pm to 7:00pm, and Monday through Wednesday by appointment.

Little Old Wine Drinkers Winery – Just north of Kingman on Winery Row, you will find our newest winery, Little Old Wine Drinkers. From Earth to Bottle is their motto, and you don't need to be either little or old (just over 21, of course!) to enjoy their Cabernet Franc and Tempranillo. Come grab a LOWDW rack card at the Visitor's Center and have it stamped at the counter before you go, then present it at the winery for a free taste.

The Hoover Dam – Located on the border between Arizona and Nevada, Hoover Dam contains the Colorado River and created Lake Mead. The dam also produces electricity for over one million Americans per year. Both guided and self-guided tours are offered every day. Great for all ages and wheelchair accessible.

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Grand Canyon West – Owned and operated by the Hualapai Indian Tribe, Grand Canyon West is home to the world-famous Skywalk, a marvel of modern engineering that allows visitors to walk 70 feet out over the Canyon on a horseshoe shaped glass bridge, providing a breathtaking view to the bottom, 4,000 feet below. Grand Canyon West is so much more than just Skywalk. Tour the Native American Village and watch a performance of native dances, hike out to take in the dramatic view at Guano point, take a helicopter tour, pontoon tour, or even ride a zipline. Cabins are available for extended stays. Just 90 minutes from Kingman, Grand Canyon West provides an exciting alternative to the traditional South Rim experience.

Lake Havasu – A wonderful city that is the home of the London Bridge, relocated from England in 1968, Havasu is well known for its fishing and boating experiences. They have a "Lake Havasu Museum of History" with documents, Native American and steamboat history. It's got beaches with picnic tables and amazing views of mountains.

Historic Powerhouse – The building was built between 1907-1909, to give power for the mines; power, lights, and water for Kingman. The power was generated by oil-fired steam-driven engines. In 1978, the Powerhouse Gang was formed and they considered a way to rehabilitate the old building. In 1997 it was converted into the City of Kingman Visitor Center.

Route 66 Electric Vehicle Museum – A collection of electric vehicles dating from 1909 up to 2014. The collection began with only 10 vehicles in 2014 but has since nearly tripled to 28 vehicles. The vehicles on display include a Rolls-Royce-style EV golf cart once owned by Willie Nelson, a Mercedes-style EV golf cart once owed by Waylon Jennings, and the Buckeye Bullet 2.5 which was the fastest EV in the world until 2016.

Arizona Route 66 Museum – A unique museum for all ages to see. It has murals, photos, and life size dioramas that capture each of the groups that have traveled along Route 66. It also contains a one-hour long movie that tells the story of Route 66 in Arizona.

Kingman Visitor Center – There are two wonderful and unique gift shops that carry a large variety of products that includes games, clothes, accessories, souvenirs, license plates, stuffed animals, etc. Offers free information and brochures about locations all around Arizona. This is a pet friendly business. Open seven days a week from 9:00am to 4:00pm. **Historic Downtown Kingman** – Contains a variety of businesses and historical buildings. It has a lot of things to offer to those visiting. It has amazing restaurants, spectacular antique shops, interesting historic buildings, and some fascinating museums. You will also get to see some stunning mural paintings on some of these buildings. Located on some of these buildings, in the downtown area, you will also get the chance to see some stunning murals.

At the heart of Kingman is our historic downtown. Down by the railroad tracks is where Kingman was born, and many of those original buildings still stand. Peppered in among them are an eclectic mix of restaurants, breweries, and shops, as well as several art installations and more than a few stunning murals. Whether you take a self-guided tour narrated by our own Jim Hinckley, or just wander and follow your fancy, this quaint area has something for everyone.

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
